Updates

City: No support for Sharon Amity project

On June 9, Charlotte City Council unanimously voted against the Housing Trust Fund giving a developer \$6 million dollars to build a five-story, 122-unit apartment building on Sharon Amity Road, just north of Coventry Woods condos. The CWNA board felt this project for low-income seniors was too large for the site, and that our area had already done its part: Similar developments are already in place nearby on Albemarle Road. The CWNA's concerns, including high density and impact on traffic, were raised at two public meetings. Residents of Coventry Woods condos and Firethorne, which adjoin the site, also opposed the developer's request for funding.

District 5 Council representative Marjorie Molina, who represents our area, said Havenridge at Sharon Ridge wasn't a good fit for our area, and advised others on the Council to oppose it.

The \$6 million was essential to the project.

Alrose cut-through will proceed

Despite CWNA objections, the Alrose stub on Glenbrier Drive will be opened for about six months while Charlotte Storm Water replaces a culvert and the bridge over a small creek just north of us. The June 30 Storm Water decision following two heated public meetings. The construction blocks entrance/exit to approximately 75 units in the Glenhaven at Firethorne condos; that traffic will be temporarily diverted onto Glenbrier Drive. Storm Water cited project cost when choosing to open Alrose instead of an originally proposed route within the Glenhaven and Firethorn properties.

Residents on Glenbrier and Coronado Drive were very concerned about increased traffic and the safety of children, strollers and dog walkers on their streets, which have no sidewalks.

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page alerts filled you in about the Charlotte Storm Water plan to temporarily open the Alrose stub on Glenbrier to cars and trucks -- and a developer's proposal to build a too-large and dense affordable living tower on Sharon Amity, just north of us. (See the updates, on Page 1). The two flyers created a substantial turnout of concerned citizens at public hearings for both projects. For many in Coventry Woods, it was the first time they heard about either.

Our newsletters and flyers reach you in a time-tested process.

The CWNA board of directors considers if a flyer or Woods Watch story is needed for our community; when a final version is approved, it goes to a printer. While information may be sent out via email, Facebook and Instagram, not everyone has them or uses them frequently. But printed information can be a reminder for all on your kitchen counter or refrigerator door.

According to CWNA treasurer Bill Cooper, \$1,100 per year is spent for printing flyers and Woods Watch for approximately 500 homes.

What the printer returns to us is batched by routes, and our volunteers are contacted.

Routes range from 39 to 51 homes, and are planned to eliminate delivery confusion. The same route maps are used every July 3 for Flag Night, when American flags are placed in each front yard in Coventry Woods. Volunteers do their route with a map and blue painters' tape (so a door doesn't get mussed or scratched). Some volunteers have been doing routes for years . A few – like Gene Tedder and Ellen & Ron Stewart – routinely do more. (Gene covers the two Farmingdale routes; the Stewarts cover the two Glenbrier routes). Gene says, "It gives me good exercise, and I get to meet a lot of neighbors. It takes me 45 minutes for each route I handle – and that includes time talking with people along the way. I usually walk an hour each day, so this works for me."

Some volunteers have favorites routes, close to their own homes. Others, like Tim Hoag, are ready to handle any route that is uncovered.

Tim's thinking: "I want to help keep the neighborhood informed."

When a regular route volunteer is too tied-up to help, or is out of town, we go through our list of members who have previously helped with newsletter/flyer distribution.

And we help first-time volunteers get their footing.

Newcomers to Coventry Woods add to our amazing mix of families from different states and nations. You can meet some in this Woods Watch series.

Name: Santi Rai

(pronounced "SAN-teel Ray")

How did you come to live on Glenbrier Drive in 2016?

I am from Jhapa, a village in Nepal. Actually, I was born in Bhutan but lived as a refugee in Nepal. Most of the time, I speak Nepalese. I moved to the United States in 2009, and lived in Portland, Ore., for three years. We have cousins and friends who live in Charlotte.

Tell us about your family.

I live with my brother, my sister-in-law and their 4-yearold daughter, Shayana Rai. Our mother lives with us, too. I am 34.

What is your occupation?

I am a full-time caregiver for our mother and my niece. My brother and his wife work full-time for Amazon. I was a little kid when we moved to Nepal, and that is where I learned to make household objects - kind of like being a carpenter. I made the wooden flower boxes in front of our house. I also know how to make things for inside our house.

What do you like about living here?

It's a good location for work – my brother and his wife work for Amazon; I occasionally work delivering food from restaurants.

I like the shopping, and the way the streets look.

If you have a question about something, where do you go to ask for an opinion or answer?

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The project was proposed years ago, but Coventry Woods residents were not notified. The Alrose cutthrough was added later, but we were first notified this spring, when construction was about to begin.

Storm Water apologized for this bureaucratic fumbling, but construction began July 21.

A June 25 memo by the Storm Water director said that following completion, the stub will be re-closed. Pavement for the temporary connection will be removed, the barrier will be reinstalled and trees will be planted.

I have a cousin who lives nearby, on Coronado. My uncle's house.

One thing I am working on now is what I need to do to get better grass to grow in my front yard.

What back-home holidays do you observe, and how do you celebrate them?

We have the same holidays they do in India, especially Diwali (The annual festival of lights is Oct. 20-21 this

We are Christians, so we celebrate Christmas.

When someone greets you, how would they say "Hello" or "Goodbye" in your native language?

"Namaste" ("na-MAS-tay") means both "hello" and "goodbye." "Ke cha? ("GEEZ-oh") is informal and means "What's up?" or "How are you?"

Where do you shop for hard-to-find groceries?

We go to Central Market for Indian/Nepali; it's on Albemarle Road, near the McDonald's. Also, Compare and Super G.

When your family goes to a restaurant, does any place come to mind?

If we go out, it's often China Buffet (Independence Blvd. at Albemarle Road), or King of Spicy (East W.T. Harris Blvd., south of Albemarle Road). Another place is Maharani, near the Best Buy that's uptown (901 S. Kings Drive).
